I would like to inform you of the National Park Service's 2003 archeological prospection workshop.

The National Park Service's 2003 workshop on archeological prospection techniques entitled Current Archeological Prospection Advances for Non-Destructive Investigations in the 21st Century will be held May 19-23, 2003, at the Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site in Collinsville, Illinois. This will be the thirteenth year of the workshop dedicated to the use of geophysical techniques, aerial photography, and other remote sensing methods as they apply to the identification, evaluation, conservation, and preservation of archaeological resources across this Nation. The workshop this year will focus on data processing and interpretation, in addition to the more basics topics involving the theory of operation, methodology, and on-hands use of the equipment in the field. Application is open to all parties interested in the use of these technologies in archeology, forensics, law enforcement, and environmental studies. There is a tuition charge of \$475.00 to cover the costs of the instructors travel and production of class materials. The instructors for the workshop include top practitioners in the field of archeo-geophysics.

This lavishly illustrated volume, written by three professional Cypriot foresters, aims to provide a comprehensive account of the woody plants grown on the island. It fills a gap in the literature on the flora of Cyprus since the only previous publication on the subject was a brief introduction published in 1949. Approx. 360 species of trees, shrubs and subshrubs are presented including indigenous, adventive and exotic plants. Brief references are also made to about 40 very rare exotics. Emphasis has been placed on species found in public areas such as parks, reforestation and roadside plantations. Some fruit trees, primarily agricultural but with ornamental potential, are also included. The book will be of value to foresters, landscapers, agriculturists and gardeners, but students, teachers, nature lovers and foreign visitors to the island should all find it of considerable interest. The finely printed illustrations of all species, including numerous details of flowers and fruit, greatly enhance the significance of the publication.

OPPORTUNITY FOR JOINING TURKEY EXCAVATION - LIMAN TEPE

Names of interested students and enthusiasts are currently being collected for volunteers of the Joint Liman Tepe Archaeological Project at Liman Tepe, Turkey. University of Haifa and Ankara University have opened the excavation to interested volunteers. Commitments will not be needed until March/April, but the permit will be submitted in Mid-December and all participants must be included on the permit. Being on the permit does not commit a person to participating, but without it they cannot participate.

Liman Tepe is located between Izmir and Cesme on the Bay of Izmir near the city of Urla. The past three seasons have exposed 3rd through 8th century pottery associated with the submerged structure. Underwater excavations during 2003 will continue the investigation of a man-made key and other areas of the submerged structure. The project is also using geoarchaeological techniques to reconstruct the characteristics of the coastline in the past.

Volunteers must be certified to dive and have some experience in archaeology, either as a student or enthusiast. The excavation will occur in the last weeks of August, first week of September. The accommodations are on the Aegean. Two people share a room with a bathroom. The project will also have a trip to Bodrum and Ephesus. The projected costs will be approximately \$400 per week for room and board and diving. Airfare and divegear (except weights and tanks) are not included. Costs during the Bodrum and Ephesus trips should amount to about \$100 per trip.

2003 SAS RENEWAL FORMS

Dear Colleague,

Thank you for your past support as a member of the Society for Archaeological Sciences. It is time to renew membership in the SAS for 2003. Membership categories and rates will remain the same for 2003, but this year, with the change in the office of the General Secretary, you'll be returning your forms to me in Pennsylvania.

SAS membership includes:

- A one-year subscription to the SAS Bulletin;
- An optional one-year subscription to the Journal of Archaeological Science (JAS) with a savings of nearly \$800 compared to the current JAS annual subscription cost. Only SAS members are eligible to receive JAS at the special SAS rate;
- An optional discount subscription to the journal Archaeometry. Again, only SAS members are eligible to receive the discounted rate for Archaeometry.

Regular membership (with JAS) remains at \$110 for the year. In addition, an optional subscription to Archaeometry remains the same at \$30 for our members. We continue to maintain alternate membership categories as well (Lifetime, Regular, Student/Retired) for those who wish to receive only the SAS Bulletin. Institutional memberships are available only to libraries, museums and similar organizations. Your current membership category is indicated on the address label by the letter at the end of the first line:

Rregular; Sstudent/retired; Llifetime; Iinstitutional. If you are a lifetime member, you need only pay if ordering subscriptions to either JAS or Archaeometry.

The renewal form also lists the credit/charge cards accepted by SAS for payment of memberships. Regretfully, we must add an additional 7% to our rates for those charging their memberships in order to accommodate bank processing charges.
