Scope

The aim of the Symposium is to promote the development and use of scientific techniques in order to extract archaeological and historical information from the cultural heritage and the paleoenvironment. It involves all Natural Sciences and all types of objects and materials related with human activity.

In general, papers should deal with the development and/or application of scientific techniques for extracting information related to human activities of the past, including the biological nature of man himself and the environment in which he lived.

Papers that deal with weathering and deterioration of archaeological objects or monuments will be welcome provided they are relevant to one of the main themes of the Symposium. Papers that deal solely with conservation techniques or the development of materials for conservation are outside the scope of this conference and normally will not be accepted.

The subjects covered by the Symposium are grouped into the following fields that form the sessions under which the papers will be presented either as oral or poster.

The Fulbright Program

Philosophy

The Fulbright Program, the premier international educational exchange program for students, scholars, researchers, and artists from throughout the world, promotes mutual understanding and peace between the people of the United States and citizens of other nations. The Program fosters cross-cultural personal interactions in an atmosphere of global awareness, academic freedom and intellectual integrity.

Accomplishments

The Fulbright Program has brought together some of the finest minds from around the globe. More than 140 countries have participated in the Program since its inception in 1946 and more than 96,000 U.S. citizens and 158,000 participants from other countries have benefited from the Fulbright experience. Many Fulbright scholars are young professionals who will return to positions of leadership in their home countries. Fulbright alumni include Nobel and Pulitzer Prize winners, prime ministers and heads of state, professors and scientists, ambassadors and artists, Supreme Court Justices and CEOs.

The Fulbright Program in Greece

Grants are awarded for projects that last from 60 days to 90 days and which may be conducted at no more than two universities or research centers in the United States. Recipients of 2006-2007 Fulbright Research Awards may begin their project as early as July 15, 2006 and must complete their project by June 30, 2007. Recipients may continue their projects under the Foundation's auspices for more than 90 days if funding from sources other than the Fulbright Foundation's is attained, but must provide documentation to verify the funding and its source. This award is open to scholars in all fields of study. Applicants must arrange their own university/research affiliation.

Grant benefits

- Monthly maintenance allowance of U.S. \$3,000.
- Round-trip airfare.
- Limited health and accident insurance (for grantee only).
- J-1 Exchange visitor visa.

Eligibility requirements

- Greek citizenship. Candidates with dual citizenship (US/Greek) or permanent residence in the United States are not eligible.
 - A Ph.D degree.
 - A minimum of five years' professional experience since earning a Ph.D. is required.
 - English language fluency.
 - A letter of affiliation (invitation) from a U.S. institution that includes:
 - 1. A clear statement from the American professor the applicant plans to work with, that the proposed time of his/her visit is acceptable to him/her and to the U.S. institution you wish to visit.**
 - 2. A clear statement that the applicant's research project can be completed within the time frame specified. This is especially important if the applicant plans to work during the summer months.**
- Priority will be given to applicants who have not had extensive recent experience in the United States.

Conditions

- Should the affiliated institution change, eligibility for the grant will be reviewed and re-evaluated by the Foundation's Board of Directors. Scholars who have already begun their research or teaching activities in the United States, or are planning to depart Greece for the United States before July 2006, are not eligible to apply.
- All candidates who submit an application are required to discuss their proposed project (in person or by telephone) with the Foundation's Executive Director.
- All candidates selected for a Fulbright grant are required to submit a medical history and examination report before their grants can be finalized.

- Fulbright grant recipients will be responsible for making their own travel arrangements in collaboration with the Foundation's travel agent, according to Foundation policies.
- Grants cannot be deferred to the following year.
- Fulbright grant recipients must travel on a J-1 visa sponsored by the Fulbright Program. It is a condition of the visa that after completion of the research program, scholars must return to Greece and reside there for two years before being eligible to immigrate or apply for permanent residence or a work permit in the United States. **The purpose of the two-year home residency requirement is to ensure that exchange visitors return to their home country and fulfill the exchange objectives of the Fulbright Program.**

Candidates should contact the Senior Program Officer in Athens or the Educational Advisor in Thessaloniki and request an application form (either in paper or in electronic format). Application forms will be available after September 12, 2005

Dear all,

A new method devised by an Italian would-be archaeologist:

"Using satellite images from Google Maps and Google Earth, an Italian computer programmer has stumbled upon the remains of an ancient villa. Luca Mori was studying maps of the region around his town of Sorbolo, near Parma, when he noticed a prominent, oval, shaded form more than 500 metres long. It was the meander of an ancient river, visible because former watercourses absorb different amounts of moisture from the air than their surroundings do.

His eye was caught by unusual 'rectangular shadows' nearby. Curious, he analysed the image further, and concluded that the lines must represent a buried structure of human origin. Eventually, he traced out what looked like the inner courtyards of a villa."

ANDROS BRONZE AGE TOWN

"Greek archaeologists have discovered the "well-preserved" remains of a large Bronze Age town dating from at least 1,900 BC on the Cycladic island of Andros, the culture ministry said in a statement on Wednesday.

Archaeologists found at least four "well-preserved" buildings - one of them retaining its ground floor walls - in the remains of a quarter, and a graded road believed to lead to a square.

A variety of mainly ceramic objects was discovered inside the buildings, including large decorated storage jars, pots and vessels, and stone tools, many of them intact.

Researchers also found a number of rock drawings on the edge of the town, which lies on the south-western Cape Plaka near the fortified site of Strofilas, a Neolithic settlement that dates from 4,000 BC.

The drawings portray boats and a combination of other symbols -- a human head surrounded by a pair of arms with open palms, a pair of feet and a circular symbol believed to represent the sun -- that archaeologists suspect corresponds to a divinity worshipped by the town dwellers."
